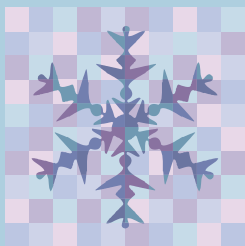

ONLINE LEARNING

As many of you know, we are offering online learning classes this year to our high school students. Starting the second semester, we will also be able to offer online college courses through Alpena Community College. It has been a new, positive learning experience for students and staff alike. We have a number of students that have completed classes and are currently taking additional courses. The courses range from all of our required classes to a wide variety of electives which include ACT Prep courses.

One of the most frequently asked questions relates to the amount of progress that needs

to occur each week. A way to calculate needed weekly progress is to calculate the number of weeks finished divided by either 18 or 36 depending on if it is a semester class or a yearly class. Students must be at their correct percentage each week. This is a great way to keep them on task. The classes are monitored by a certified staff member, but this person does not calculate the grades. The grades are figured by the computer program. If you have questions regarding online opportunities, please contact me via email at reilly@haleschools.net.

First Grade News

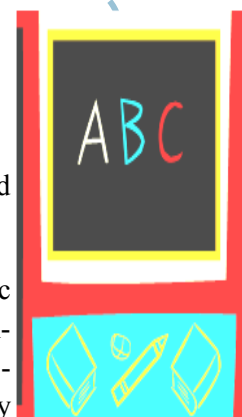

Of course the holidays bring much excitement for second graders and we will be celebrating with singing and classroom projects.



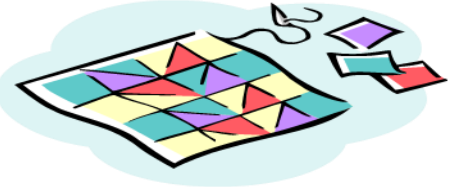


Third Grade News

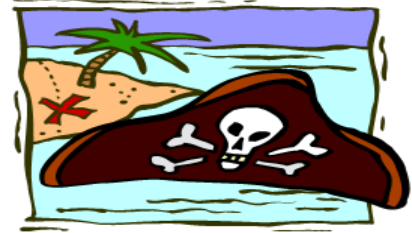
Ninth Grade News 9

HIGH SCHOOL MATH HELP



If your high school student is struggling in math or could use some homework help, you should know about our Prentice Hall Math website. Just go to PHschool.com and put in the appropriate web code. For Algebra 1, the web code is aek-0099, for Geometry, it is afk-0099, and for Algebra 2, it is agk-0099. This will bring you to a page with a link at the top that says "Homework Tutorial Videos", which takes you to Videos arranged by chapter and section. Each section has 3 videos for your student to watch and get help on the current section they are working on in class. Below the Homework Tutorial Video link there are links for each chapter where your student can take sample quizzes and tests. They will be corrected immediately and feedback will be given to your student to help them correct their mistakes. We also have tutors available here in the morning and after school.

HALE WAY PROGRAM

The Hale Way Program online learning experience is gaining more ground in its second year. We are up to 37 students now, or as we like to call them researchers, who are working on earning their high school diploma in an online format. The majority of our researchers are those who cannot attend a traditional school environment due to pregnancy, teen parents, or being employed full time to support a family. Our waiting list is

So Now You've Had Your Parent-Teacher Conferences

So now you've had your conferences and there are areas your child needs to work on. Now what? Here are a few helpful tips.



1) Look through your child's backpack. Papers go home regularly from their classrooms showing what they've done that week. Taking the time to go through these papers can help you with knowing what they are learning.

2) Set aside time for homework each night. Whether a child has homework or not, there are skills that they can review and strengthen. Use the papers that come home from school to guide you on mini-review lessons at home. Give your child one or two math problems similar to the math work sent home. Review spelling and vocabulary words. This may only take five or ten minutes every night.

3) Talk to your child. Ask them about their day. Encourage conversations about what they're learning, who they play with, what was their favorite thing they did in school. This shows your child that school is important to you and it should be important to them. It also helps sustain learning. You could even have your child "teach" you something new they learned today. Again, going through their backpacks, may give you a heads-up for reluctant kids. You may have to initiate it at first, but the more you practice, the more comfortable they will be about sharing.

4) Talk with teachers. Establishing a positive relationship with your child's teacher is very important. Continue to follow up on your child's progress by calling the teacher after or before school, setting up mid-marking period conferences, or writing notes will help keep current on your child's progress.



5) Find support. A mentor, tutor, or family member can help with struggling learners. This person must be able to build a positive relationship with your child and be willing to work on a regular basis. Also, find support for yourself. Parents often need to find other people to talk out their problems with.

6) Set a regular bed time. Children aged 5-12 need 7-10 hours of sleep every night. Some kids, like adults, can survive on more or less sleep. Each person is different. Find out how much time your child needs to sleep to be at their best. Too much or too little sleep can cause serious problems in school. They may act out, become hyperactive, be lethargic and sleepy, not "be with it", cranky, whiny, or testy.



7) Establish routines. Children need to understand what is going to happen and when. Getting students up at the same time of day is an example of a routine. Whenever possible, allow students to do for themselves, or learn to do for themselves. For example, buy them an alarm clock to set and wake them up each morning. (You'll still need to make sure they are getting up!)



8) Eat Healthy. Eating regular meals with the five food groups in each meal can greatly increase brain function. Choosing healthy snacks like carrots, apples, and grapes give extra boosts to our bodies during the in-between meal times. Sitting down at a dinner table with your family can be an extra bonus. Not only does this allow us to watch what our children eat, but provides us with a nice time to talk with our children about their day.

- **1 favorite baby picture** of the student, also for the feature page.

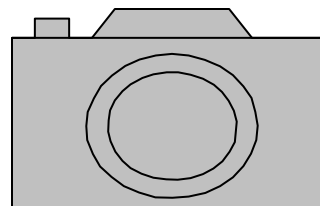
WE NEED YOUR PICTURES!
